PLAYGROUNDS ARE NOT TO BE USED BEFORE OR AFTERSCHOOL

Rapid antigen testing – Positive result

Students and staff will do the tests at home and must report any positive test results to their school. If staff or students receive a positive test result at any time, they must report this through the Department of Health system (Rapid antigen tests | Coronavirus Victoria) or via the coronavirus hotline at 1800 675 398.

Students (or their parents) must also report a positive result to their school, either through the VicEd COVID portal <https://covidtest.educationapps.vic.gov.au/s/login/SelfRegister?startURL=%2Fs%2F> or by phone or written notification; this is so the school can support them, record that they will be absent while in 7-day isolation and let the rest of the school community know there has been a positive case onsite and that they should monitor for symptoms.

Parent must create an account to register their details.

SCHOOL DROP OFF / PICK UP

When dropping your children off at school, and picking up, please ensure you **park in a permitted area** before letting them out of the car. We understand you're busy, and the available parking spaces aren't terribly numerous in Carruthers Drive, however, this doesn't give you the automatic right to decide that simply stopping in the middle of the road is the right way to drop kids off.

Remember not to let your children get out (or get in) on the road side of your car. There are doors on both sides of your car. Use them! Drop off times and pick up times are far too busy!

For the safety of all children, don't forget to **use the manned crossing**. If you've parked all the way up the street, on the other side of the road from the school, train your children to walk along the footpath to the crossing.

No stopping signs

If there is a 'no stopping' sign, you are not allowed to stop or park your car in, or partly in, that area for any reason. Dropping off or picking up passengers or goods in a 'no stopping' area is not permitted.

D.E.A.R.

During a D.E.A.R. session, Tayte read about a girl who was presenting an experiment at a Science Fair. Together with Mrs Antonello, Tayte followed the instructions to complete the Lava Lamp experiment, Tayte's experiment worked so much better than the girl's experiment in the book. (She spilt the oil and caused a catastrophe.)

Tayte's Lava Lamp (Only complete this with adult supervision).

Ingredients:

- Vegetable Oil
- Water
- Food coloring
- Original Alka Seltzer tablets

Procedure:

- 3/4 fill a 1.25 litre bottle with cooking oil
- Fill the rest of the bottle with water
- Allow the water to settle (5 minutes)
- Add six drops of food colouring
- Take 3 Alka Seltzer tablets and break them into 2 or 3 pieces and add them to the bottle.

Watch what happens?

The water and oil do not mix and the oil doesn't change color because the food coloring is water soluble. The Alka Seltzer reacts with the water to make bubbles of carbon dioxide.



THE NEW PLAYGROUND



The bubbles attach themselves to the blobs of colored water and bring them to the top of the bottle. When the bubbles pop the blobs of colored water fall back to the bottom of the bottle.

Growth Mindset Fortnightly Focus.

The fortnightly focus for Growth Mindset is Switching from Fixed to Growth Mindset.

Ask your child to think of some fixed mindset phrases commonly used at school, home or anywhere else (“I am not good at this”, “I can’t do anything right”) and write them down.

Then work together to create a list of alternate phrases that reflect growth mindset (“I’m not good at this YET”).

GROWTH MINDSET

I'm not good at this → I can't do this yet.

I give up → I'll use some of the strategies I've learnt.

I made a mistake → This was my first attempt at learning.

This is too hard → If something is hard, it means I'm learning.

I can't do this → This is going to take time and effort to master.

PREP

Term 1 Week 7 and 8 Weekly Overview

The prep students have done an amazing job coming to school and settling into the routines. In weeks 7 and 8 prep students will be focusing on the following things.

Reading: We are continuing on with concepts about print. Some things we are working on are front cover, spine, back cover, direction of reading and 1:1 correspondence. Students will also be practicing the hearts word **'are'**. We have learnt **"the", "was", 'of' and 'said'**.

Writing: In MSL we will be covering the letters **I, P, H and E**. Students will be learning the sound these letters make as well as the correct entry and exit points when forming these letters. So far the letters they have learnt is **Ss, Aa, Tt, Nn, Ii, Pp, Mm and Ee**.

Maths: Students are ordering, making and counting numbers up to 20.

YEAR 1

Half way through the term already, but we have learned so much!

This week we are learning about making predictions, text to self connections, inferring and thinking about if the text makes sense when we are reading.

We are working on developing our handwriting and publishing skills with focus on starting points, identifying the problems and solutions in different settings when writing a story.

In MSL we are working on the open and closed vowel sounds and in numeracy we are working on place value.

In humanities we are working on how life has changed for our families in terms of entertainment, food choices and toys.

Thankyou to those families that have returned their sheets sent home. This will help us support your child when they make an oral report of how life has changed for your family members.

Bravehearts' will be visiting our school on the 24th March. Bravehearts' is a personal safety education program called *Ditto's Keep Safe Adventure Show*. Ditto's Keep Safe Adventure show has been educating Australian children since 2006, providing them with personal safety tools and strategies while supporting positive self-esteem and resilience-building.

Coming up some dates to remember are Harmony Day which is on Monday 21st March so your child can come dressed in their multicultural clothing, if they wish.

READING

Students will be bringing home levelled books for their nightly reading. These books are meant to be on the easier side as they are meant to be read for enjoyment and practise. Students will be working on more challenging texts in class.

HOMEWORK

Students in Grade 2 are meant to be doing 15 minutes of 'homework' per night. This is important because it helps them to develop good habits. The 15 minutes can include reading, Mathletics and My Numeracy tasks.

SPELLING

The students will be learning spelling techniques (MSL) in class. This will not be a part of their homework. Over the past two weeks, they have learned about 'Super Silent Sneaky E' and the 'Sail Away' rule—featuring the ai/ay sound.

SPECIALISTS

Specialists for Grade 2 this semester are PE, Performing Arts and Italian. Visual Arts will be taught next semester.

Please make sure that students come to school with a hat and drink bottle every, along with a big smile and a positive outlook.



YEAR 3

Our students have made it past the halfway mark of Term 1! They have now completed 3 out of their 4 chess lessons and it is great to see how much fun and enthusiasm they are showing during these lessons. Students will have one more lesson next week and then will participate in our Chess Fest on Tuesday the 5th of April where they will play against other grade 3 students.

In maths, we have continued to look at place value concepts such as regrouping and odd and even numbers. Students have been creating amazing persuasive texts to persuade their reader about specific topics. 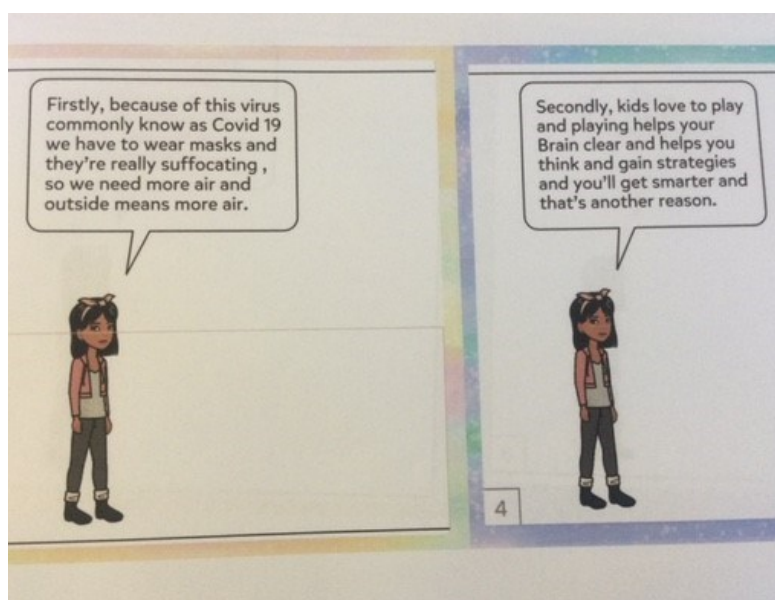
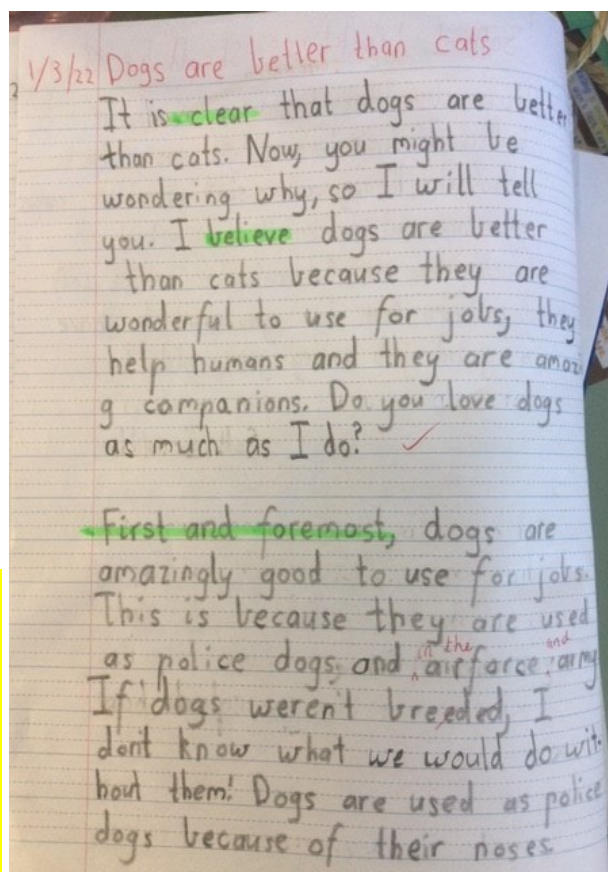

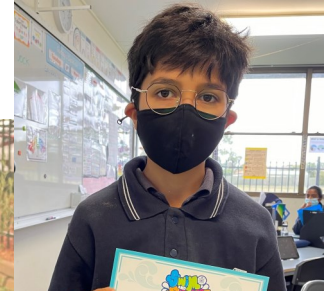
YEAR 5

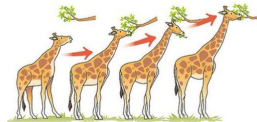

Science

Science lessons for Term 1 were completed in an intensive block during swimming week. There was fabulous student engagement with our Biological Science unit that investigated the evolution of living things with a focus on adaptations. Nida has included a great definition of adaptation above. These adaptations occur over many generations of a species. Did you know that polar bears have black skin to absorb heat from the sun and hollow fur which traps air inside to assist their buoyancy? Also, camels can close their nostrils to prevent sand from entering their nose!

Students are now completing adaptations presentations for their chosen animal to present to their class over the next few weeks. Here are some examples from student adaptation presentations.

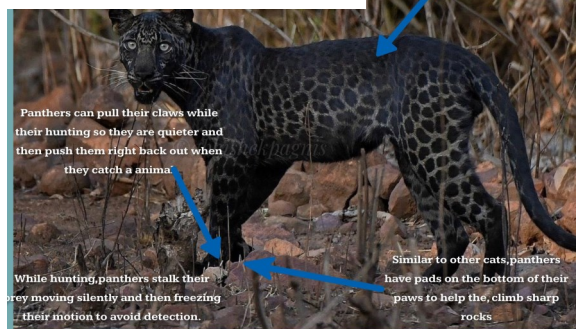

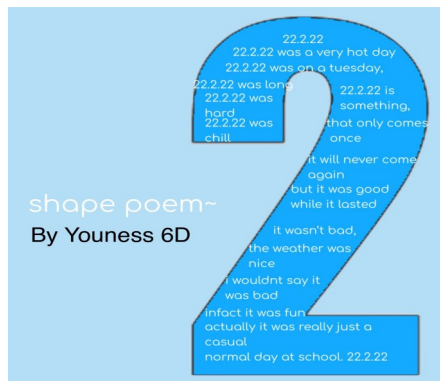

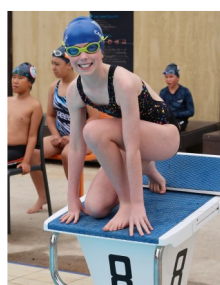
