## Rapid Antigen Testing – Positive Result

Students and staff will do the tests at home and must report any positive test results to their school. If staff or students receive a positive test result at any time, they must also report this through the Department of Health system (Rapid Antigen Tests | Coronavirus Victoria) or via the coronavirus hotline at 1800 675 398.

Students (or their parents) must also report a positive result to their school, either through the VicEd COVID portal https://covidtest.educationapps.vic.gov.au/s/login/SelfRegister?startURL=% 2Fs%2F or by phone or written notification; this is so the school can support them, record that they will be absent while in 7-day isolation and let the rest of the school community know there has been a positive case onsite and that they should monitor for symptoms.

#### Attendance

Families will be receiving an email through Compass early next term regarding late attendance. School starts promptly at 8.45am. 

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

## YEAR 4

#### Humanities

During term 1, in humanities, year 4 classes have focused on understanding the importance of social groups, connection and diversity. We have considered what social groups exist in the school and in the Wyndham community. The students explored the cultural background of their family and their classmates. To bring their learning together, students created their own club, or group, that would be inclusive. They designed advertising to promote the group to other people. 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## PROFESSIONAL LEARNING COMMUNITY NEWS

#### ENRICHMENT

Look at what's been happening in Enrichment!

#### Literacy

Over the last two weeks, we have been drafting our poems and receiving feedback from our peers, as well as Miss Green. A few of us have moved onto planning our published piece. In reading, we have been doing our independent reading and then writing in our reader's notebook.

#### Numeracy

Last week, we completed our second Maths Olympiad task and started our unit on Chance. We looked at the likelihood of events occurring. This week, we are looking at the differences between theoretical and experimental probability. Some of us will also be looking at tree diagrams, two way tables, and set notation.

#### **Humanities**

After exploring First Nations people and how they lived, we moved onto looking at who came to Australia on the First Fleet, and why they came here. We identified the character traits of early settlers and compared their traits with our own. This week, we are looking at the impact of the arrival of Eurpoeans on First Nations people and the environment.

#### Science

In science, we are looking at adaptations. We learned that adaptations are changes that occur in an organism (animal or plant) to help them successfully survive and reproduce. We explored the three different types of adaptations: structural, behavioural, and physiological. Structural adaptations are physical features of an organism that adapt according to new conditions externally in their environment. Behavioural adaptations are behaviours of an organism that change to help them survive and reproduce. For example, the purple oxalis plant closes its leaves when something touches it because the leaves are very fragile. This is a behaviour for survival. Physiological adaptations are changes that occur internally in an animal to help them survive or reproduce. For example, reptiles are cold blooded and mammals are warm blooded.

#### April Fool's Day

Miss Green and Miss Meracis played a trick on us this year! In the morning, we were told we would be receiving a brownie at recess time. Little did we know that we were actually receiving a 'brown E!' Our disappointment was only short lived because Miss Meracis made her delicious choc mint brownies over the weekend and gave us a piece on Monday. Yum!

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


