CURRICULUM NEWS

Reports

On Monday, 17th of June, our semester 1 2024 reports went live, meaning parents can download their child's report through Compass. Semester 1 reports contain all of the learning tasks from Term 1 and 2, as well as a progression point indicating their current level.

Humanities domains (Civics and Citizenship, History, Geography, and Economics and Business) are assessed differently from our core subjects, Mathematics and English. Humanities domain content is taught throughout each term, students may receive 12 months of growth in these domains as they are taught once a year rather than throughout the year. For example, a student in Year 4 is expected to receive a progression point of 4 in the humanities domains in the middle of the year and at the end of the year.

Parent Teacher Interviews

Wednesday, 26th of June, is our Parent Teacher Interviews. Bookings are currently open but will close at 4 pm on Tuesday 25th. Parent Teacher Interviews are 10-minute sessions. This is an opportunity to discuss your child's learning goals, Semester 1 report, and learning behaviours. Students are welcome to attend however this is not a requirement.

Children are required to be picked up from school at 12.25 pm on this day. Out-of-School Hours Care will be operating from 12.25 pm for students who have been booked in.

Parent information session

We thank all our families who attended the parent information session- assessment on the 18th of June. The information session covered information around common assessments, types of evaluations, and why/how we use assessments. We will continue to run information sessions throughout the year. Information about these sessions will be shared via Compass.

Student Eyecare Program

We are pleased to announce that the Student Eyecare Program will be running at our school in term 3 and 4 this year. An optometrist will be onsite during school hours to provide students with a free comprehensive eye examination that is covered through Medicare Australia. 1 in 6 students have eye conditions that go undetected. This is due to the high level of visual demand on their eyes from books, laptops, tablets and smartphones. Every student who has permission given by a parent or guardian, will receive a full report about their eye health and a prescription will be provided if glasses are required. The prescription can be taken to any optical store to get the glasses made. Don't miss out on this wonderful and free opportunity. Information on how to give consent will be made available in coming weeks.

ART ROOM NEWS

CLAY! CLAY! CLAY! CLAY! CLAY! CLAY!


All the students who work with Mrs Menhennet in Art Studio 1 have been immersed in clay for 5

weeks. They have had so much messy fun and have learnt a lot about clay, including where it comes from.



And where does clay come from? Out of the ground, of course! Hoppers Crossing is one of the places in Victoria where you can dig

clay right out of the ground, as everybody who works in their home garden, in this area, would know.



And what have the students been making?



Grade1 – Singing fish, after learning how to make a pinch pot.

Grade 2 – Double pinch pot animals, after learning how to successfully join two pinch pots together.

Grade 3 – 2D or 3D Owls, using a variety of techniques.

Grade 5 - Slab buildings with joined walls

Grade 6 – Legacy tiles

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All the students have agreed that there is a big difference between what they made in the first week of clay to what they make in the last week of clay.

Students from grade 1 to 6 will have their clay work fired in the kiln. This can be a slow process as we still have the same size kiln that we had when we had 240 students and that was a long, long time ago! The photo is of a kiln that is similar to ours.

It takes 48 hours to fire one kiln load which, depending on the size of the clay work, may be less than one grade at a time.

After the work is fired the students will use a variety of methods and techniques to colour their



work. The grade 6 students will use glaze to colour their Legacy tiles which then require an extra firing! The service man came out and inspected the kiln last week and was surprised we had such a tiny kiln

for such a big school. He told me that our old kiln is very rusty and worn out and won't last much longer. So, cross your fingers (and toes and everything) and let's hope it hangs in there until we get all the student's work fired for this year!!!Mrs Russell's students who work in Art Studio 2 are not going to miss out on all the fun. Mrs Russell and Mrs Menhennet will swap students for 5 weeks in Term 3 so Mrs Russell's students will get to have a messy time and get clay under their fingernails as well!



Art smocks - where are they???

As there has been clay work in Art Studio 1 and painting happening in Art Studio 2 it has been disappointing that many students do not have an art smock to wear to cover and protect their expensive uniforms. As Visual Arts teachers we try to use kid safe washable paint but there is NEVER a guarantee from the paint manufacturers that their paint will wash out of all fabrics, all of the time!



So, has your child got a **FUNCTIONAL ART SMOCK**?

- ALL STUDENTS are required to bring a FUNCTIONAL ART SMOCK in their school bag
- FUNCTIONAL ART SMOCKS are GENEROUSLY SIZED to easily COVER the student's uniform
- FUNCTIONAL ART SMOCKS GO ON AND OFF EASILY
- FUNCTIONAL ART SMOCKS ARE WATERPROOF!
- small thin t shirts or flimsy aprons are <u>NOT FUNCTIONAL ART</u> <u>SMOCKS</u> as they don't perform the function of keeping expensive school uniforms clean




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- FUNCTIONAL STUDENT ART SMOCKS should be in school bags EVERY DAY or kept in your child's locker tub so they can be utilised by students for Visual Arts or classroom activities as required
- spare art smocks will **NOT** be available in the Visual Arts studios or classrooms
- If a student **DOES NOT HAVE THEIR OWN FUNCTIONAL ART SMOCK** in their school bag or individual locker tub when required, THEY WILL NOT BE **EXCUSED OR EXCLUDED** from the activity
- And NO, student ART SMOCKS DO NOT have to be BLUE!
